# **Preparing Students for Conference**

Once students are selected, advisors should inform their students that though this is a competitive program with awards, leadership

and national competition opportunities, the Youth and Government program is, at it's core, character driven with the values of respect,



**Initial meeting** should involve what current state issues that spark bill ideas; peer discussion facilitated by student club leader

**Second meeting**—students bring their bill topic and have found it not to be a current law; set up a calendar with students for their assignments and deadlines; bring bills next meeting

**Following meetings**-ensure that they are researching issues related to their bill, using the approve bill template and following bill writing procedures, Parliamentary Procedure and have students take turns chairing debate. (all found at www.ymcatexasyg.org)

**Initial meeting** should involve reading the case once highlighting prosecution and once highlighting defense.

**Second & Third meetings**—students Should take or be assigned roles as attorney or witness (teams are 5-8 people); begin to write questions for the witnesses based on their affidavits that will prove their case both defense and prosecution.

**Following meetings**-attorneys write opening statements and briefs (appellate) ; begin to go through the trial with witnesses or for appellate, begin to practice arguments with other students, teacher or volunteer acting as justice.

**2 weeks before District Conference** Continue to run through the case, witnesses can object and find holes in arguments; appellate finish briefs; set up scrimmages with other clubs if you Can; get an attorney to help you prepare

**After District Conference**-debrief, revise bills and determine who will be attending State Conference in January.
